Tampa Haitian Flag Day Celebration

The Haitian American Alliance, Inc., in collaboration with Motown Maurice Productions and other community partners hosted the third annual Tampa Haitian Flag Day Celebration on May 13, 2006 at Lowry Park. Approximately 1000 people attended the event, which was to promote Haitian culture and community relations in the Bay area. The event also held a community health component, and Moffitt and

TBCCN partners took part with educational information and screenings. Local Haitian American physicians collaborated with the event's health components, serving as medical resources to Haitian community members with health questions. Andy Numa, Director of the Haitian American Alliance said, "We were very satisfied with the

turnout. In this third year, our attendance tripled from last year's event. The partnership with Moffitt and other community partners was really key in making this event a continued success and positively impact the Haitian American community." The day was rounded out with live Haitian music, food and fun for attendees of all ages.


The weekend of May 12-14, the Faces of Courage Foundation held their second annual African American Women's Cancer Retreat at the Rotary Camp Florida in Brandon. The camp was open to women of color whose lives have been touched by any type of cancer. This year 67 women attended the retreat. Holding true to the foundation's motto, "Cancer is serious, camp is serious fun," the camp was held in true Faces of Courage

style featuring music, dancing, arts and crafts, spa treatments and a "death by chocolate" party. The camp also included many points of cancer education throughout the weekend, including the "straight talk about cancer" discussion.

African American Women's Cancer Retreat

This retreat was created in an effort to address the growing need to bring African American women together for fun-filled weekend where they can learn from one another. Faces of Courage founder and CEO, Peggie Sherry says, "Survivors can tell you the ins and outs [of cancer] in lay language that books can't tell you, because they have been there."

Faces of Courage was the first organization in the nation to do an African American women's retreat like this. Sherry says, "The true testimony of the camp is that women tell each other. Everyone who attended the camp last year told someone."
