Outreach

Community Health Events

Each year, TBCCN coordinates and supports a number of community health events and educational activities in the tri-county area, reaching over 1,000 individuals. Our major events include:

Cinco de Mayo Fiesta

The annual Cinco de Mayo Fiesta is a cultural and educational event held in Dade City. It is a collaborative effort between Farmworkers Self-Help, Inc., and other community agencies. The event provides health information and resources to over 200 people.

Men's Health Forum

Specifically focusing on the medical needs of men, Moffitt Cancer Center and its numerous partners host this annual event. The event provides numerous resources, health

information and screenings to over 500 men.



Day of Pampering

This annual event is a collaborative effort between the Hillsborough County Health Department and local agencies to address breast and cervical cancer early detection and prevention to over 100 women.


Celebrate You

Is an annual event for women sponsored by the James B. Sanderlin Neighborhood Family Center and TBCCN. The event provides over 80 women with health information, education and pampering services.

Education

Cancer Education Stations

TBCCN responded to an urgent need to create solutions for the development of effective cancer interventions



in our community by implementing seven cancer education stations that were developed in collaboration with our community partners.

The education stations house low literacy cancer education materials and are equipped with a TV and DVD player. The stations are located within partner sites and provide a center for TBCCN outreach workers and community partners to conduct cancer education workshops. These education stations bring cancer prevention, control, and awareness to members of the community. Some examples include increasing awareness about breast cancer, cervical cancer and prostate cancer.

Materials Development Project

Based on community partner feedback, we developed a series of easy-to-read cancer education brochures and photonovellas

in Spanish, English and Haitian-Creole. These materials are distributed at various community events within the tri-county area.

Training

Cancer Education Workshops

As a result of the partner needs assessment, we offer cancer education workshops that are designed to meet the needs of our community partners. Based on feedback from partner interactions, workshops topics include: clinical trials 101, developing low literacy materials, and grant writing. These programs are open to our community partners as well as other organizations within the Tampa Bay area and aim to build community partner capacity, knowledge and awareness around the topics presented.

Community Based Participatory Research Training Program (CBPRTP)

CBPRTP recruits junior investigators who are interested in community based participatory research. The training program consists of education, mentoring, networking and field


immersion activities for increasing investigator awareness and skills for applying socio-cultural and communication perspectives for conducting community-based research.



Research

Colorectal Cancer Awareness, Research, Education and Screening (C.A.R.E.S.)

TBCCN acknowledges the importance of conducting research aimed to assess the effectiveness of tailoring programs to match the preferences of the medically



underserved population to increase screening. Therefore, building on prior work in the Tampa Bay Community Cancer Network partnership that identified a lack of colorectal cancer screening resources, TBCCN developed a study that incorporates a community clinic-based colorectal cancer intervention: Colorectal cancer Awareness, Research, Education and Screening (C.A.R.E.S.).

The CARES study has partnered with community-based clinics to help reduce the barriers to colorectal cancer screening among medically underserved, racially/ethnically diverse populations in the Tampa Bay Tri-county area. Through the development of an educational toolkit, informative focus groups and the promotion of screening, TBCCN is addressing colorectal cancer health disparities within the Tampa Bay area. C.A.R.E.S. study participants will receive a free home stool kit for colorectal cancer screening.
